Overview

The Tropical Conservation and Development Program (TCD) at the Center for Latin American Studies hosts this conference to convene leading TCD alumni and colleagues to discuss *New Horizons, New Challenges in Tropical Conservation and Development* on Thursday, February 21 – Saturday, February 23. In presentations by invited speakers and through group discussion the conference will draw upon the collective experience of an exceptionally talented group of people. Attendees will describe their vision of the coming decades, taking note of emerging scientific and policy issues, new methodological approaches, and the changing socioeconomic, political and environmental realities in Latin America and elsewhere.

The conference takes place as the TCD program is institutionalized at the University of Florida through creation of a new interdisciplinary graduate program involving participation by fourteen academic units. In recognition of TCD's ongoing contribution, the Ford Foundation made a \$2M gift in 2000 to endow the basic program, matched by another \$2M from the State of Florida. Holding the conference celebrates these important steps, by taking stock of shared accomplishments and by considering what the future may bring.

This gathering promises to be as intellectually insightful for participants as it will be strategically productive for TCD, to stay abreast of developments at the forefront of the field. It will also provide a unique opportunity for the new generation of TCD students and faculty shaping the direction of the program, as they interact with conference participants.

On the Monday and Tuesday following the TCD conference, the University of Florida's School of Forest Resources and Conservation and the Forest Management Trust will host a tropical forestry conference, "Working Forests in the Tropics: Conservation through Sustainable Management", February 25 and 26, 2002. Conference Focus

Each day of the TCD conference has a specific theme that will guide presentations and discussions. On Friday, we will concentrate on emerging priorities and challenges in tropical conservation and development. On Saturday, we will focus on strategies for further action. The following questions provide a framework for the conference:

Emerging Priorities and Challenges in Tropical Conservation and Development

What have been the key historical trends in tropical conservation and development over the past two decades, and how can we expect these trends to evolve during the next two decades? What have been the most important paradigm shifts and methodological innovations in the field of tropical conservation and development during the past two decades? Given the dynamic socioeconomic, political, and environmental realities in Latin America and elsewhere, what are the emerging priorities for further advancement of tropical conservation and development? What are the most critical challenges and needs on the horizon facing donors, international NGOs, local NGOs, governments and universities?

Strategies for Future Action

What are the theoretical, methodological and practical responses needed to effectively address these challenges? What kind of training, research, interventions and institutional arrangements will be required to meet future challenges? What strategies and steps can the TCD program, and its network of alumni and colleagues, take to meet future tropical conservation and development challenges?
